


Wright Interconnect Project



Project Highlights

- WIP is proposed to connect rapidly expanding Marcellus supplies to Iroquois markets in New York and New England
- New physical receipt at the proposed Constitution Pipeline interconnect in Wright, New York
- Utilizes Iroquois' existing Wright Compressor Station property
- Approximately 22,000 HP of transfer compression with cooling and associated facilities
- Capacity = up to 650,000 Dth/day
- Proposed In-Service May 2028





Project Overview

The Wright Interconnect Project (“WIP”), an expansion of Iroquois’ existing compression and metering facilities in Wright, New York, is being developed in conjunction with the proposed Constitution Pipeline to enable delivery of up to 650,000 Dth/d of natural gas from the terminus of the Constitution Pipeline in Schoharie County, NY into both Iroquois and the Tennessee Gas Pipeline under a 15-year capacity lease agreement with Constitution.

The proposed Constitution Pipeline is being developed to bring rapidly growing natural gas supplies from northeastern Pennsylvania to serve the energy needs of New York and New England – markets presently served by Iroquois. Together, WIP and the Constitution Pipeline will provide access to new, lower cost sources of gas supply while enhancing reliability and diversification of energy infrastructure in this area.

Leasing the WIP capacity from Iroquois will allow Constitution to eliminate their proposed compression facility, thereby reducing the impact on the environment and the Wright, New York community.

Regulatory Process

The Federal Energy Regulatory Commission (FERC) will be the lead agency for permitting WIP in conjunction with the proposed Constitution Pipeline.

On December 2, 2014, FERC granted a Certificate of Public Convenience and Necessity for WIP. However, Constitution did not move forward with its Constitution Pipeline project, and in turn, Iroquois did not proceed with the Wright Interconnect Project.

Recent interest in the development of much needed energy infrastructure to help increase supply and lower energy costs in the Northeast and in New England, has resulted in renewed interest in developing both the Constitution Pipeline and the Wright Interconnect Project.

Subsequently, on February 13, 2026 Iroquois filed a Petition for reissuance of FERC’s certificate authority. The FERC certificate process provides for a coordinated environmental review, prior to construction of the project. WIP will also require permits and approvals from state and other authorities.

Iroquois is proud of its reputation as a responsible corporate neighbor who contributes to the well being of the community, and we commit to work with affected stakeholders throughout the permitting and construction of WIP. Since the early 1990s, Iroquois has maintained a presence in the community and we will continue to utilize the Wright Compressor Station as a field office location.

Environmental Sensitivities & Enhancements

As a local, New England based company, we live in and care about the communities we serve. Respect for the environment is an important part of Iroquois’ culture, and we are dedicated to preserving our environment by seeking ways to minimize intrusions to, and maximize protection of, our natural resources. WIP will be subject to an extensive environmental review as part of the regulatory process.

Iroquois has collected and analyzed site specific environmental information to understand potential impacts, developed mitigation plans, and prepared environmental reports for review by the FERC and other permitting agencies. Construction will not commence until these agencies are satisfied that the Project can be constructed without significant impacts to the environment.

Safety Considerations

The safety of our employees and communities is a top priority for Iroquois. Interstate natural gas pipelines are America’s safest transportation network, and Iroquois is very proud of its longstanding, excellent safety record. The proposed facilities will be designed, built and operated in a safe and environmentally-responsible manner.

All phases of construction and operation are monitored by various government agencies such as the U.S. Department of Transportation and the New York Department of Public Service. As part of Iroquois’ ongoing Public Awareness Education Program, we work with, and provide training to, local emergency responders to partner in safety.

Iroquois will work to ensure the safety and security of its construction sites. Safety inspectors will be monitoring the sites and security personnel will be on site as required.

Construction Impacts

Iroquois is committed to minimizing disruptions during the construction of this project. Through our outreach initiative, we will also identify questions and concerns about construction and will work with the community and local officials to address these issues.

Community Participation

Early outreach to our stakeholders is essential for us in order to identify environmental issues and concerns. During the review process, we will provide information about this project and seek input in a number of ways:

- Through communications with landowners, local officials and other interested stakeholders
- Notification letters mailed to residents within 1/2 mile of project site
- Newspaper advertisements
- Presentations to government agencies as requested

What the Community Can Expect

Upon receiving all necessary permits, construction activities for this project are expected to begin by spring/summer 2027. These activities will include mobilization of personnel and equipment, site preparation, and installation and testing of new compressor and gas cooling facilities. Construction should be completed by May 2028.
